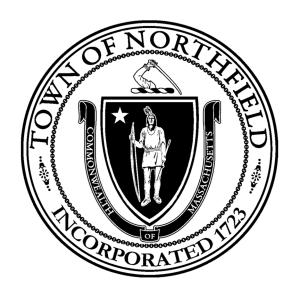

Report of the Finance Committee

To the Citizens of Northfield:

The current Fiscal Year has been challenging for everyone. However, our Town Government has navigated successfully all the challenges and now we are looking forward to FY '22. The Finance Committee's role is to advise voters of our recommendations on the Operating Budget and the Articles contained in this Warrant. Our proposed budget is intended to fund sufficiently the current level of services and maintain the Town's financial health. These recommendations have been determined following several meetings of consideration and evaluation of the requests and supporting information provided by Town Departments, Boards, Committees and Commissions.

We are supporting the budget requests for FY '22 with the exception of a portion of one request that included restoration of \$2,812. for clerical support for that one Commission. Last year the Town voted to support money in the budget to cover a Boards Clerk to serve several Boards, Committees and Commissions and we feel that is sufficient. We are recommending a Cost-of-living increase of 1.7% for our staff and employees in what we believe to be a reasonable accommodation of current costs.

A prime concern of the Finance Committee is always balancing the needs of our various Departments, Boards, Committees and Commissions with the effect on our Tax Rate. We also have to consider the working conditions for our employees including maintenance of the equipment that they use as well as their safety on the job. Supporting the requests contained in this Warrant may result in a small tax increase.

We are recommending support for our Pioneer Valley Regional School Assessment as well as support for our assessment from the Franklin County Technical School. Northfield is a member of both of these School Districts so that our students can have choices to support their career plans. The individual School Committees have the responsibility of requesting their budget needs which are reflected in our assessments. Northfield is represented by 3 of our citizens on the PVRSD School Committee and 1 citizen on the Franklin County Technical School Committee.

We are recommending the specific financial Article amounts requested in this Warrant as being essential at this time. We have not taken a position on the Local Option Meals Tax Article.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

<u>Appropriation</u>: An authorization to make expenditures and to incur obligations for specific purposes. An appropriation is granted by Town Meeting and is usually limited in time and amount as to when it may be expended. Any part of the general appropriation not spent or encumbered by June 30 automatically reverts to surplus, which may become Free Cash. A specific appropriation is carried forward from year to year until spent for the designated purpose or transferred by Town Meeting vote to another account.

<u>Assessed Valuation:</u> A valuation set upon real or personal property by the Board of Assessors as a basis for levying taxes.

<u>Budget:</u> A plan of financial operation consisting of an estimate of proposed expenditures for a given period and the means of financing them. The budget is voted in the spring at Town Meeting for the fiscal year that begins the following July 1st.

Capital Budget: A plan of proposed capital outlays and the means of financing them for the current year.

<u>Cherry Sheet:</u> An annual statement received from the Massachusetts Department of Revenue detailing estimated payments to the town for the next fiscal year and the estimated state and county government charges payable by the town. The Assessors in setting the tax rate use these amounts. The actual receipts and charges may vary from the estimates.

Community Preservation Act (CPA): The Town adopted the Community Preservation Act (CPA) in 2002. This Act allows the town to collect up to a 3% surcharge (Northfield has voted only 0.5%) on property tax bills (the funds can be matched up to 100% by the state when funds are available), which creates the Community Preservation Fund, to use for Community Preservation purposes. Each year, the town must appropriate, or reserve (but not necessarily spend), 10% of the funds for <u>each</u> of the three Community Preservation purposes: Open Space, Historic Resources, and Community Housing. The remaining 70% of the funds can be appropriated or reserved used for any of the three purposes and for Recreation and for administration.

<u>Debt Service</u>: Payment of interest and repayment of principal to holders of the Town's debt instruments.

<u>Fiscal Year:</u> A 12-month period, commencing July 1 and ending June 30, to which the annual budget applies. Fiscal years are often denoted FYXX with the last two numbers representing the calendar year in which it ends, for example FY18 is the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018.

<u>Free Cash</u>: Free cash is the portion of unreserved fund balance available for appropriation. It is not cash but rather is approximately the total of cash and receivables fewer current liabilities and earmarked reserves reduced also by reserves for uncollected taxes. This is also referred to as "available cash". The amount is certified annually by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue.

<u>General Fund:</u> The major town owned fund which is created with town receipts and which is charged with expenditures payable from revenues.

<u>Grant:</u> A contribution of assets by one governmental unit or other organization to another. Typically, these contributions are made to local governments from the state and federal governments. Grants are usually made for specific purposes.

<u>Line-Item Budget:</u> A format of budgeting that organizes costs by type of expenditure such as expenses, equipment, and salaries.

<u>Overlay:</u> The amount set aside to allow for uncollected property taxes. An amount for overlay is added to the appropriations and other charges. Overlay Surplus – see below.

<u>Overlay Surplus:</u> The unused amount of the overlay for prior years, which may be transferred, by vote of the Town, to the reserve account or used for extraordinary items.

<u>Property Tax Levy:</u> The amount produced by multiplying the assessed valuation of property by the tax rate. The tax rate is expressed "per thousand dollars" of assessed valuation.

<u>Reserve Fund:</u> Money set aside by Town Meeting to be allocated by the Finance Committee for extraordinary or unforeseen expenditures.

Stabilization Fund: A special reserve funded by Town Meeting for future expenditures.

Terms associated with Proposition 2½:

<u>Debt or Capital Exclusion:</u> The Town can assess taxes in excess of the levy limit by voting a debt exclusion or capital outlay exclusion. This amount does not become a permanent part of the levy limit base, but does allow the Town to assess taxes for a specific period of time in excess of the limit for payment of debt service costs or for payment of capital expenditures.

<u>Excess Levy Capacity:</u> The difference between the Town's tax levy limit and its actual tax levy for the current year. It is the additional tax levy that could be raised without asking for an override.

<u>New Growth:</u> The amount of property tax revenue that the Town can add to its allowable tax levy as a result of new construction, alterations, subdivisions or change of use which increases the value of a parcel of land by more than certain amounts.

<u>Override:</u> An amount, voted by the Town, which is permanently added to the levy limit. A majority vote of the Selectmen allows an override question to be put on the ballot. Override questions must be presented in dollar terms and must specify the purpose of the override. Overrides require a majority vote of approval by the Town.

<u>Tax Levy Limit:</u> The maximum amount of the tax levy for a period under the restrictions of Proposition 2½. It is calculated as the prior year limit plus new growth plus 2.5% of the prior year levy limit.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to accept section 15B of chapter 60, to establish a tax title collection revolving fund pursuant to subsection (c) for the treasurer-collector and to vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or otherwise provide a sum or sums for this account. Such tax title collection revolving fund shall be accounted for separately from all other monies in the town and to which shall be credited any fees, charges and costs incurred by such officer under sections 15, 55, 62, 65, 68 or 79 of chapter 60 and collected upon the redemption of tax titles and sales of real property acquired through foreclosures of tax titles. Expenditures may be made from such revolving fund without further appropriation. subject to this section; provided, however, that expenditures shall not be made, or liabilities incurred from this revolving fund in excess of the balance of the fund nor in excess of the total authorized expenditures from this fund, nor shall any expenditures be made unless approved in accordance with sections 52 and 56 of chapter 41. Interest earned on a tax title collection revolving fund balance shall be treated as general fund revenue of the town. Expenditures from a tax title collection revolving fund authorized for the treasurer-collector shall be spent to pay expenses incurred under this chapter in connection with a tax taking or tax title foreclosure, including, but not limited to, fees and costs of recording or filing documents and instruments, searching, and examining titles, mailing, publishing, or advertising notices or documents, petitioning the land court, serving court filings and documents, and paying legal fees.

MOTION: I move that the Town vote to accept section 15B of chapter 60, to establish a tax title collection revolving fund pursuant to subsection (c) for the treasurer-collector as defined in Article 9.

NOTES: This article would provide funding to the Northfield Open Space Committee for the restoration of the Mill Brooks Trail. This 1/5-mile trail is located in the Mill Brook Wetlands Area between the Dickinson Memorial Library and the Northfield Golf Course. This trail system serves as an excellent birding and wildlife viewing spot close to the village center and part of the trail is used as a "story trail" by the library. The funding will be used to purchase materials to replace and repair bridges used to cross wet/marshy spots and to protect the wetland.

NOTES: This article would provide funding for the Northfield Council on Aging to install a storage shed to created easy access to recreational equipment for the Senior Center and to house the COA's mobility lending library (wheelchairs, etc.). This will replace the current storage situation which is a closet in Town Hall. The location of the shed will be behind the Town Hall, exact placement to be approve by the Selectboard. The style of the shed will be in keeping with the style of the other buildings on the site as recommended by the Historical Commission.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or otherwise provide a sum or sums of money to pay for Right-of-Way Expenses for the Schell Bridge Project, or take any other action thereon or in relation thereto.

Submitted by the Selectboard.

<u>Motion:</u> I move that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$25,000 to pay for Right-of-Way expenses for the Schell Bridge Project.

MOTION BY: HEATH CUMMINGS

VOTE REQUIRED: MAJORITY PASSED UNANIMOUS

NOTES: This article will pay for legal and engineering expenses to determine how abutting property owners' property interests are being affected, the maps necessary to show this impact to the abutter, and to work with the property owners to resolve and potentially pay for the costs of any impacts.

The Finance Committee recommends this Article.

At this point the Moderator stepped aside for the next two Articles (33, and 34)in order to avoid any conflict or appearance of a conflict of interest.

The Town Clerk then asked for a motion to designate someone to preside over the next two warrant articles.

Alexander Meisner was nominated and was seconded by Heath Cummings.

There was no debate, and a vote was taken. PASSED UNANIMOUS
